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Happy New (Church) Year! We begin again, in quiet and expectation, defying the world, which has already moved on to Christmas, treating it as a holiday which begins on November 1<sup>st</sup> and ends at midnight on December 25<sup>th</sup>. For us, the cycle of time measured by the church begins again, with the cool blue color (known as "Marion blue," to keep Mary's quiet expectation before us), the minor key in our hymns and the invitation to quiet.

The new liturgical year is a new start, and yet so much more than just a chance to begin again. It is a time of reflection on both where we have come from and where we are going. We have come from another year of knowing Christ and making him known. We have moved from the expectation of our last Advent to the pure white of incarnation and showing forth Christ, journeying with him in ministry and miracle through the darkness of death and the glorious light of resurrection. We have celebrated the joy and the scarlet fire of the coming of the Holy Spirit, and settled into the long green season of learning and practicing how to be a disciple. And now we begin again.

How fortunate it is that so many other anniversaries of sorts come together for me at this season. Our 150<sup>th</sup> Celebration concluded with a visit by the Bishop just a few weeks ago. We have moved from a focus on honoring and celebrating the past ministry and mission of St. James' to looking ahead to our next 150 years as a community focused on the promises made at baptism: to seek and serve Christ in all persons, to work for justice and peace, to break bread together and to pray.

The last Sunday of the liturgical year, celebrated as Christ the King, marks eight years for me as your Rector. As many of you pause to put into words what St. James' means to you (as requested by the Ministry Committee), I find that an easy question to answer.

After spending five years as seminarian and Curate at St. Paul's in Englewood, I knew it was time for me to seek a position as Rector. That frustrating and enlightening search took two years. One church did not call me because I had never been a Rector before (later, they called a man who had never been a Rector before). Another did not choose me despite the fact that I was a perfect fit (according to me!). I withdrew from

consideration in another despite the fact that they thought I was a perfect fit; proving once again that a real relationship of priest and people requires that they fall in love with each other.

I tried not to get my hopes up as I entered into interviews with the search committee of St. James'. I knew I was cooked when I looked at the first question of round one: "What is your personal ministry statement?" referring to the 25-word summary on my Clergy Profile. They could not possibly have known that I had never written one, contending that 25 words were too few to be meaningful. I was also resistant to trying to fit my story into 140 tiny boxes.

However, I passed that and other tests as slowly we courted each other and fell in love. I was not certain I would be chosen, and was afraid to give too much for fear of being rejected. But on the night of my last interview with the Vestry, I left the church and stopped at Quik Chek for a cold drink.

On my way home, I decided to check out the church one more time to see how difficult the decision might be, based on whether deliberations were still going on. As I slowly rolled down Washington Street with my lights off to escape detection, The Mitcham House was dark and the last car was leaving. Ten minutes, max. That was either very good or very bad news.

The rest of the story is clear; it was very good news for all of us. You may not realize that you as a community form me as much as I form you, with vision and relationship. You have come to be devoted to things I love: Education for Ministry, Appalachia, and fruit and yogurt at family breakfast. You have brought your lives (which I did not know) to liturgy (which I know like the back of my own hand). Every time I bless a relationship, bury a beloved family member, or send a teenager off to drive with a prayer, I know that our community is being woven into the body of Christ. We have come to accept each others' unique qualities. I can make a last minute change without one drop of anxiety; you will show up when someone needs help; I am the apostrophe police of St. James'; you are open to new activities and ideas whether you agree with them or not; I will never remember where I left my keys.

Finally, The Feast of St. Nicholas, December 6<sup>th</sup>, is the 13<sup>th</sup> anniversary of my priestly ordination. No matter how difficult or challenging my role as Rector may be, my priestly identity is the ground of my being. I know of no sane person who would take on the job of Rector without the deep well of commitment to vocation, and no healthy Rector who does not depend upon it to make the job possible. St. James' is a place where my identity is accepted and nurtured. I am sure that is true for many of you as well.

### on Parish Development

I understand what the phrase "Parish Development" means, but when Peter Saros starting working with St. James' earlier this year, I wasn't sure how it would be accomplished. How exactly does a church grow and play a more meaningful role in the lives of the congregation? After the recent Parish Development weekend, I think I'm beginning to understand. Two weeks ago, I attended the Friday night session, which was for the group called "the rest of us". As we gathered around, Peter asked us to answer a few simple questions. As we went around the room and everyone answered the questions, I began to see a different side of those in the room. Individuals openly discussed the biggest issues facing them today and I heard many different challenges that people are dealing with; many of which I was not previously aware.

We also heard ideas for what people would like to see at St. James'. Not surprisingly, many of the suggestions address those areas where people are struggling. For example, many people are currently unemployed and there were suggestions for forming an unemployment support group or holding a job fair. Some folks, looking for a respite from today's hectic pace (working, commuting, chauffeuring kids to activities, etc.), decided to plan gatherings for young families, where the parents can socialize while the children are enjoying a separate activity.

So, what did I learn going through this process? I learned that people attend St. James' to worship, but many people would like St. James' to play a bigger part in their life. They are looking for a place to enjoy the fellowship of other parishioners while filling some need. Support groups, book clubs, information seminars and children's activities were just a few of the suggestions. I encourage everyone to help St. James' further develop into a place that meets the needs of the congregation and the community. Don't sit back and assume someone else is going to organize the activities you would like to see. If you have an idea, bring it forward. We'd love to hear it!

**Golden Cauliflower Soup**

*By popular request, the soup served at the Senior Luncheon*

**Ingredients:**

2 (10 ounce) packages frozen cauliflower or 1 small head fresh cauliflower, separated into small flowerets (about 4 cups)  
 2 cups water  
 ½ cup chopped onion  
 1/3 cup margarine or butter  
 1/3 to ½ cup unsifted flour  
 2 cups milk  
 1 tablespoon chicken flavor instant bullion or 3 bullion cubes  
 2 cups (8 ounces) shredded extra sharp cheddar cheese  
 1/8 to ¼ teaspoon ground nutmeg and parsley

**Directions:**

In medium saucepan, cook cauliflower in 1-cup water until tender. Reserve 1-cup cooked flowerets. In blender or food processor blend remaining cauliflower and liquid; set aside. In large heavy saucepan, cook onion in margarine until tender; stir in flour. Gradually add remaining 1-cup water, milk and bouillon; cook and stir until well blended and slight thickened. Add cheese, pureed cauliflower, reserve flowerets and nutmeg; cook and stir until cheese melts and mixture is hot (do not boil). Garnish with parsley. Refrigerate leftovers.


