As a preparation for my sabbatical, I paid a visit to the L'Arche community in Haverhill, Massachusetts. L'Arche was created in France in 1964 by Jean Vanier, a man so distressed by the numbers of intellectually disabled people in institutions, he invited two of these men to live with him in a home environment. That first L'Arche home, and the other 136 communities in 35 countries around the world today, are created as communities of faith. They are homes where people with and without disabilities live together in community.

The community I visited is was created in 1984, and presently is a network of four houses: Ghandi house, with four core members, who are developmentally disabled men, three live-in assistants, two live-out assistants and a house manager. Assisi, Nazorean, and Peace houses also house core members, assistants, and house managers. A downtown main office is used for financial and business affairs, as well as a place for training and meetings.

I arrived just before five on a Tuesday night. It was community night, when all the houses gather for supper out and bowling, so I was able to meet all fifteen core members of the community. They all wanted to know my name and shake my hand. Debbie wanted to know where I was born, and Phil bonded with me when he discovered I had hearing aids just like him.

Then there was the bowling. I had never seen candlepins before. Fran offered to coach me on how to toss the small wooden balls down the lane. Despite her expert instruction, I maintained my tradition of lowest score. Back at the house, the assistants helped the core members get ready for bed and work the next day. The following several days were full of meetings with staff, conversation with folks around the breakfast table, and visits to the other houses. While each house had its own personality and routine, following supper, which was a cooperative venture from preparation to cleanup, all shared prayer time.

Everyone formed a circle and the lights were dimmed. Candles were lit, and music played. Community prayers of the people were read, and each person had a turn to pray aloud or silently. Phil is a man whose speech is largely unintelligible. To hear his prayer, though, was to know his close relationship with God.

I had expected to see an operation of group homes in action. I was interested in the fact that L'Arche at its heart is a faith community, and wanted to see how that played out in daily life. What I was not prepared for was the light.

There was a light in the community that was indescribable but recognizable. It was the light of God. No, the community is not without conflict. People don't love each other with a mushy idealistic love. L'Arche is not a sixties commune. These people love each other in the daily activities of life: shared meals, getting dressed, having a shower, getting into the car. They love each other for better or worse. I am excited about the other communities I will visit in this sabbatical time, both in the United States and Great Britain. Because we are called in baptism to seek and serve Christ in all persons, I pray for myself and for you to be open to see Christ's light in unexpected places over the next few months.

Warden's Words

SO THE TIME HAS FINALLY ARRIVED! After much anticipation (and quite a bit of planning), Cathy is about leave on her well-deserved Sabbatical. The next three months will be, in a word, different. Since Cathy's arrival almost nine years ago, she has been a constant presence in our spiritual lives. Her presence is always felt: at Sunday services, assisting us in Pastoral issues and even navigating us through a building project. Her absence will leave a void that will be hard to ignore.

The congregation at large may not have been privy to all the details in planning the Sabbatical. As one might imagine, many things needed to be planned well in advance. There were major tasks, such as obtaining priests to cover all the services. And there were many, many smaller tasks that required attention. Cathy, the Sabbatical Committee, the Vestry and the Wardens worked together and tried to plan everything ahead of time. One part of the planning was to seek out grants to help pay some of the expenses. Just last week we learned that the Bishop's Office has arranged for a \$3000 grant to be used for the Sabbatical. This was certainly welcome news since the original amount earmarked for the Sabbatical was minimal, just enough to cover the bare necessities. Going forward, the Finance Committee may (starting with the 2011 budget) include a budget line for future Sabbaticals. If we can manage to put some money away each year, hopefully ample funds will be available to a future Vestry planning a Sabbatical.

While this Sabbatical is a time for Cathy to rest, reflect and get reinvigorated the same can be said of the congregation as well. The Vestry and Sabbatical Committee felt the time could be used to re-energize the congregation. Over the next three months, be ready to join your fellow parishioners in some fun activities meant to promote fellowship.

Vestry hi-lites from the April meeting

- The Price bequest, long in litigation, was resolved. St. James' received \$25,000, which the Vestry allocated to staff compensation, the Building Fund (mortgage plans include projected receipt of \$10,000 annually), Capital Improvement (as we plan for tower repair), and kitchen finishing and supplies.
- Sabbatical budget, from Diocesan Investment Trust of \$8985.15, fixed at \$7,000, including \$2,500 sabbatical clergy salary and other expense. Remainder (\$1985.15) to go to kitchen expense. Letter written to Bishop by Wardens

The gas lines are in, the sinks are in, the hood and fire suppression system is in and by next Sunday, all inspections should be complete. We will have bacon, eggs and pancakes for breakfast BUT before anything is baked in our new ovens, we want to bake bread in the ovens that will help us celebrate the body of Christ. Hopefully, the bread used in our Eucharist next Sunday will come from those ovens.

Please put the **Memorial Day parade** on your calendars. We will participate again this year with a float. The parade is Monday the 31st and we plan to set up the float and get everything ready on the Saturday before. We had a great time last year and we are looking forward to an even better time this year. If you would like to add something to the float, please contact me.

We are still looking for a co-chair to fill our Outreach/Mission Strategy and a chair for hospitality committees. If you are interested in either, please contact one of the wardens to talk.

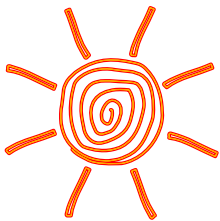

Sabbatical Q & A

Why a sabbatical?

From the diocese to the parish, it is recognized that priests and parishes need regular sabbatical time for refreshment and re-visioning. The mission and ministry of the church is the responsibility of the people. However, parish organization (one priest, one parish) makes that a challenge. Periodic, deliberate times of separation keep both priest and community focused on what God is calling them to do, separately and together.

How long is a sabbatical?

A typical clergy sabbatical is one month for each year of service. The Diocese of Newark recommends the same, with a maximum of six months for seven years of service. Our Rector's contract provides for three months after five years of service; she is completing her ninth year with us.

Who will do the Rector's duties while she is away?

Part of the sabbatical budget is used to employ a sabbatical priest to guide the liturgical and spiritual life of the parish and provide pastoral care, as well as to take on some administration. St. James' is fortunate to also have others who will volunteer as clergy supply and backup. The Wardens will assure that pastoral needs are met and that the programs and activities of this time run smoothly. They will be ably assisted by the Parish Administrator, the heart of the church office and skilled administrator.

What is the Rector's sabbatical plan?

The plan is for refreshment, study and quiet. Cathy will visit and study L'Arche communities (see letter), travel to Hawaii with her family and spend time with the Community of the Holy Spirit at their convent.

May: visits to L'Arche Erie and Bluestone Farm (CHS sisters operate this sustainable living community in Brewster NY)

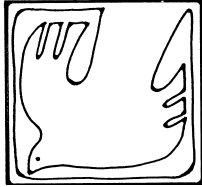
June: visit to Kona, HI, where Cathy, Ted, Alex and Vanessa will spend two weeks at a Vicarage (no priestly duties required!), graciously donated by St. Augustine's Church through a colleague Cathy met at CREDO.

July: visit to St. Deiniol's Library in England, a residential library where she can study and visit two more L'Arche communities nearby <http://www.st-deiniols.com/>

After the first two weeks, Cathy will be blogging her sabbatical, as regularly as the Spirit moves!

What is our sabbatical plan?

The Wardens have expressed this in their letters; we have planned more "one service Sundays," to give you more family time; several informal gatherings simply for fellowship and fun -- pizza on the porch, movie night, bowling, -- watch for these events. Your Vestry will be visioning who we are in 2010 and where we go from here as part of Parish Development Consultant Peter Saros' work with us. Some folks have set their own personal goals for this time.



St. James' Sabbatical Priests and Deacons

The Rev. Jeanette Hile is a Deacon in the Diocese of Newark, and Chaplain at the House of the Good Shepherd, where she has formed a choir and brought joy and song to the Sunday worship service which regularly draws 40-plus people. Jeanette is also Professor of Music at Seton Hall University, where she has taught for more than 30 years. Greet this ecclesiastical bundle of energy on Sunday, May 23rd!

The Rev. Sheila Shuford, our own beloved Deacon, has recently taught sign language here at St. James' to a standing room only crowd of 25 eager students. In April, she presented a workshop at the Enable conference, "Disability and Faith. Sheila is Chaplain at Greystone Park Psychiatric Hospital where she provides services to deaf and hearing patients. Sheila will preside at Holy Communion by a Deacon on May 23rd at 8 AM.

The Rev. Abigail (Abby) Hamilton is a regular at St. James' as she shares her precious retirement time with us. Abby is devoted grandmother and wise woman of the cloth whose life in the church demonstrates that theology and living are two sides of the same coin. Abby has been in the Diocese of Newark for all of her priesthood, which began with ordination in 1977 as one of the first women ordained in the Episcopal Church. Abby says, "It amuses me to know that I am still the canonically senior woman in the diocese :>)". We are blessed to have Abby with us May 9, 16 and 30.

The Rev. Elizabeth (Betsy) Myers, our sabbatical priest, comes to us straight from an interim priest position at St. Luke's in Hope. She was ordained to the diaconate in 1974 and the priesthood in 1977. She is experienced in interim and sabbatical ministry and is retired from the Diocese of Bethlehem. Betsy loves to golf, has spent time as a Dean of Women and teaching religion, and has a wicked fine sense of humor. We are so happy that Betsy is willing and available to guide us during sabbatical time. She will be presiding at the liturgy in June, July, and the first week of August, and providing pastoral care for the entire sabbatical time. Watch the calendar for our Thursday evening chapel services when Betsy will celebrate a midweek Eucharist. Betsy lists her marital status as "single, with two dogs."

A Note About Our Liturgy

When the Worship Committee and I gather to plan our liturgical life for the summer season, we consider liturgies which will minister to our combined congregations. We all have our preferences in style and language, and we strive not only to be faithful to the people of our congregations (for after all, the liturgy is "the work of the people"), but to be welcoming to visitors who may be with us for a brief time in the summer.

Our liturgy is grounded in the Book of Common Prayer. We also recognize the need to challenge ourselves by opening ourselves to new experiences of worshipping God. For these reasons, St. James' uses alternate liturgies on fifth Sundays of the month when they occur, during the summer, and occasionally on appropriate feast days.

This summer our celebration of the Holy Eucharist will be from the tradition of the Anglican Church in New Zealand. The New Zealand Prayer Book, published in 1989, followed 25 years of revision and experimentation. Like our own Book of Common Prayer, it was developed out of a culture (theirs, a Pacific cultural setting), using the best scholarship available, and with the goal of enabling a community to pray. It is described in the Preface as "a lively book, inclusive in language, comprehensive in purpose and rich in content." As with our own Book of Common Prayer, there were those who believed the language had gone too far, and some who believed it had not gone far enough. Since the purpose of liturgy is not to protect a certain linguistic form, but to enable a community to pray, any Book of Common Prayer is time-bound and only captures a moment in the process of liturgical change.

We welcome you to join in our worship here at St. James', whether you are here every Sunday or this is your first visit. **BOLD type indicates the people's part.** We hope that in this worship, as in all worship, you find a way to experience God and respond to God's eternal love and Jesus the Christ's call to discipleship.

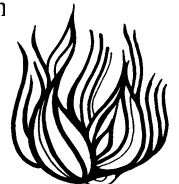

EfM, Education for Ministry

As we leave worship on Sunday morning, we pray, "And now, Father, send us out to do the work you have given us to do, to love and serve you as faithful witnesses of Christ our Lord."

EfM, Education for Ministry, has been, for many, a fun and amazing way to grow in grace. It's a unique mix of guided study, genuine community, theological reflection, and transforming worship. It's a college-level Bible study that not only teaches facts but shows us how to mine the Scriptures for ourselves. If Church gives you a fish to eat for the day, EfM trains you to fish for yourself so that you can eat for a lifetime. And it expands your sense of community: remember those wonderful conversations about the meaning and purpose of life you used to have? You can have them again, and the friendships they build, too. Worship can be something you do not merely attend.

But EfM is not free. It requires a willingness to examine your faith to find a deeper faith, it will take 2-4 hours of study each week (Sept.-May), 2-3 hours in

seminar each week, and \$340 per year, including textbooks (scholarships are available). It's not just for Episcopalians. The seminars are far richer with participants from other traditions. So please invite friends from other denominations to join with you.

You commit to one year at a time; 4 years are available. The first year will enable you to master the Hebrew Scriptures; the second the Christian Scriptures; the 3rd year focuses on Church History; and the 4th on present day issues and theology.
