ON A RAINY MORNING, a teenager was driving along Route 46 in heavy rain. His truck fishtailed and the next thing he knew, he was upside-down at the side of the road. He managed to release his seat belt and climb from the vehicle. He was unhurt. Later, his mom looked into the cab of the crushed truck, stunned that her son did not have a scratch on him. What caught her eye was the guardian angel visor clip given to him at church when he received his driver's license. It is enough to give anyone chills.

I am always happy to hear stories like this: a story of deliverance from tragedy, loss avoided, protection. And since my life as a baptized person raises the question, "Where is God in this?", theological reflection kicks in. In the Education for Ministry (EFM) program, theological reflection is a process we use to connect our everyday lives to the holy, especially through scripture and the experience of the church. TR is at its best when it looks like the answer is simple, but wrestling with the story brings us deeper into our lives as baptized people. In this story, we could say the blessing of the angel went with the teen and protected him. Or, the angel was just a symbol, and God protected him. But what would we say if he had been hurt, or what about those teens who do not have an angel on their visor?

Disciples of Jesus Christ know there is no simple answer, and in fact, many times there is *no* answer. They know that being in community as the body of Christ does not protect them through a

piece of metal, even a blessed piece of metal. They know that bad things happen because we are human, not because God does not protect us. They know that there are things we will never understand, and sometimes it is enough to know that the answer to the question, "Where is God in this?" is "everywhere."

Our strength to live into and through all the stories of our lives comes from our life together in God. We were joined in this life through baptism, and gathered at St. James' to keep our promises. We are resuscitated each week at worship, our children are nurtured in the stories of our faith and our teens are encouraged to find God in the stories of their lives. We live together day by day and year by year in fellowship, celebrating our joys and mourning our sorrows. We practice forgiveness and mercy. We put aside getting our own way in favor of what is best for the community. We give of ourselves, our time, our money. We are challenged by the needs of the world, and respond to them as best we can. We continue to seek God through the physical symbols of our lives together: a quilt, a kitchen, an altar, a backpack, a cup of coffee, an angel visor clip.

It is a privilege and a joy to be priest in this community.




gives all Sunday School children the opportunity to participate in choir without having to find time in busy schedules to come to church on another day to rehearse. Important dates to remember:

Food News

Marge Ames served Raspberry Pecan Bars at Coffee Hour on Sunday, September 26th. Here is her recipe as requested by highly appreciative munchers.

RASPBERRY PECAN BARS:

- 2 cups flour
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 3/4 cup butter
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp vanilla
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans
- 10 oz jar raspberry preserves - seedless
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans

Heat oven to 350. In medium bowl, combine flour, sugar, salt, butter, and vanilla. Beat at slow speed, scraping bowl often, until well combined and mixture resembles small peas. Stir in 1/2 cup pecans. Set aside 3/4 cup mixture.

Press remaining crumb mixture in 8 or 9 inch baking pan. Spread preserves over crumb mixture. Sprinkle with 1/2 cup pecans and reserved mixture.

Bake 35 to 40 minutes until lightly browned and bubbly. Cool completely.
