WELCOME. It's such a common word. It adorns floor mats outside all sorts of entryways. When we go to Appalachia, we see "welcome to Pennsylvania" "welcome to Maryland" "welcome to West Virginia." There are places where people offer "welcome" as a greeting as I enter: "Welcome to Wal-Mart!" "Good evening and welcome. Two for dinner?" "Welcome to the greatest show on earth!"

Jesus said, "Whoever welcomes you welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me

A few weeks ago, I was invited to attend the ordination anniversary of the pastor of our local Roman Catholic congregation. The pastor is a colleague and friend of mine, and when I called to say I would be there, he asked me to vest and join him at the altar. We processed into the church and I took my place with acolytes and Eucharistic ministers. The pastor celebrated the Eucharist, and welcomed his people to the table. The Eucharistic ministers gathered around, and received the bread and wine, and brought it to the people.

Now I know the policy and theology of the Roman church: I was fully prepared (I thought) for the reality that I would not be served communion, let alone assist in its serving. To the Roman church, I am not a person who is eligible to share in the body and blood of Christ consecrated at their altar; this is clearly stated in their Missal. But I was not prepared for how excluded I felt. The people came forward and reached out for the bread and drank the wine. I felt very left out.

As deeply hurtful as this experience was, there was a gift in it. I remembered Confirmation classes, and teaching the students about what The Episcopal Church stands for. The altar is God's table, not ours. Because we are both catholic and protestant, we know the sacredness of the altar as well as the openness of Jesus to all. A little simple, but true nonetheless: the best of the Roman and the Protestant traditions. *Via media* in action.

But even Episcopalians can get comfortable in their welcome. We can easily use our observations of the custom of restricting communion to members as an opportunity for Roman Catholic bashing. "See how open we are, and how closed they are." The truth is our canons restrict communion to baptized Christians only. Each time I offer the bread and wine to non-baptized people, I am violating the canons of the church. But The Episcopal Church is involved in the debate and discussion of whether "open communion" should be the appropriate,

just canon for our time. So you will find the invitation to the altar may vary from place to place.

Even beyond the canon of open or closed communion, beyond "The Episcopal Church welcomes you," there is the larger issue of what God is doing through the Eucharist. Not only are all welcome, but all are invited to take part in the holy meal. The word used for "welcome" by Matthew is δεχόμενος, literally translated as "receive." More than welcome, it is to receive in a welcoming way. It is used to describe people welcoming God, like receiving and sharing in God's salvation and thoughts. It is receiving what is offered; an intimate kind of two-way street.

So understood in our welcome is an invitation. We are to not simply to open our doors, but to go out into the street to invite people in: in to our worship, in to our community, in to share in our food. And inherent in the invitation is the recognition of the concrete physical expressions of welcome in the name of Christ.



"And whoever gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones in the name of a disciple—truly I tell you, none of these will lose their reward." A traveler in hot dusty Palestine would appreciate a cup of cold water. What a reception! A genuine welcome. More than that, an invitation.

Yesterday our Parish Hall was the site of invitation and welcome. Families with hungry children had been invited to participate in a summer extension of the school year backpack program. In collaboration with the United Way, St. James' is the site where families will come every two weeks to receive food to supplement tight food budgets in the face of limited income and high prices. Yesterday was the first pickup for the forty-one registered families with a total of 68 children. Bags of mac'n'cheese, soup, pudding, ravioli, peanut butter and other supplemental foods were given to grateful – or tired, or angry or embarrassed – parents.

That was the welcome part. Then came the next step: the invitation. I watched the leaders of the program brainstorm how we could be *more* helpful: expanding our grant base to provide more nutritious food; including information about other services, like clinics or dental care; finding ways to secure fresh foods for the pickup dates. Going the next step. Pushing ourselves to give more. A cup of cold water. A bag of groceries. A friendly greeting, the assurance that someone cares. An invitation into a space of welcome, if only for a few minutes. An oasis of

sorts in the desert of financial struggle. A cup of cold water in the desert.

We are to welcome others as we would welcome Christ himself. We are to invite others as if they were Christ himself. Jesus said, "Whoever welcomes you welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me." Welcoming. Invitation. Our calling.

This allowed us to breathe a sigh of relief, knowing that the funds are in hand to complete the project. We should have no problem paying off this loan in a year (or less) and the leadership of St. James' is extremely grateful for this generous offer.


