I remember vividly the days before my ordination as a deacon on June 1, 1996. I remember the last days of seminary at Drew Theological School, sitting in the second floor classroom watching the late spring blossoms and brilliant foliage of the recently unfurled leaves. And as I watched the beauty of

God's creation just yards

from my seat, I remember wondering whether it really mattered whether Paul wrote the letter to the Ephesians or not. Or whether knowing the exact tense of the Greek verb in a pericope would help me minister to people in the congregation I would someday lead. Or whether it was even important to be able to define pericope, or to be able to casually work it into a conversation.

But I also wondered about deeper things: wondering whether I would be able to deal with the many and varied personalities in a congregation when I was having a hard time with seven other students in a precept; dealing with my fear of not being a good enough pastor or my anxiety about whether I could effectively handle situations which awakened in me old and unresolved feelings and conflicts. In short, I wondered, will I be able to be a disciple? will I be able to follow Jesus? For it was at Drew I was beginning to respond to stories of the disciples' arrogance, stupidity and cowardice not with the attitude: "...how could they be so arrogant, stupid, cowardly... I would never be that way!" but rather, "...oh my God! ... that could be me...being so arrogant, stupid, or cowardly."

In the middle of Mark's gospel, Jesus asks his disciples: "Who do people say that I am?" He has just shown who he is: the master of the storm, the one who casts out demons, the healer and worker of miracles. But the disciples just don't get it. So Jesus begins to draw the picture of what a disci-

ple's life would be like. I imagine the disciples following Jesus at a distance now, talking among themselves. They cannot imagine that to be God's chosen people would mean suffering and death. So they turn their focus to the real world and their real concerns: since their leader was the Messiah, how would they then arrange themselves in his kingly rule? Later, Jesus asks them what they were discussing on the road. Mark says, "And they were silent." And they were silent. Silent in the face of their own arrogance. Silent in the face of their own stupidity. Silent in the face of their own cowardice. Silent because they did not need to say a word. Jesus knew, if not the exact topic of conversation, at least the way it was going. And so he began to teach them in earnest what it means to be a disciple.

It means to welcome a child. It means to be servant of all. It means to deny oneself. It means to lose one's life. The way of the disciple, like the way of Jesus, is not the way of worldly glory and greatness, but the path of service and sacrifice. The path that leads oftentimes to betrayal and the valley of death.

Discipleship is what we are about as Christians. We claim to be followers of Christ. Some might think that what seminarians are about is the calling to ordained ministry. But our first call is the call of Christ, "Follow me." How that plays out in our individual lives may be as ordained ministers; it may be as mothers or plumbers, friends or partners, prophets or pray-ers or teachers. Where we sometimes get stuck is in the idea that somehow, ordination is the next logical step after life as a committed layperson

I remember my own call to ordained ministry which lurked around the corners of my life for years. I already was a wife and mother. I had a successful vocation as a social worker and therapist. I was a committed layperson. But when I finally decided to test the call in a formal way, I was so full of the assurance that it was right, I thought I would explode. It's good that God gives us that gift; we need it when the first blush of excitement wears off. When the drive to seminary classes becomes tedious. When

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the papers and exams and sermons overwhelm us. When our own faith in ourselves, each other, and God is shaken to the foundation.

I remember the day I was ordained deacon. We are not to wear a clerical collar until that day. I was so obedient, I hadn't even tried it on! It took me twenty minutes to figure out how to button the clerical shirt and get the collar on. I was very conscious of my collar; it was kind of stiff and reminded me at every turn that I was wearing it. If anyone had asked, I would have said it was a symbol of my priesthood: the yoke of Christ, blah blah. It really was a badge of honor, something I had worked hard for. I secretly liked the way people looked at me when I was wearing it. It meant I was holier than thou. I found myself on the road with the disciples, dragging a little behind Jesus, trying not to think about what lay ahead.

Today I can put on my collar with one hand while driving the car. I frequently forget I am wearing it, with occasionally embarrassing results, also while driving the car. It was in my calling to discipleship rather than my call to ordination that Jesus was able to speak to my arrogance. To speak to my stupidity. To speak to my cowardice.

One of the prayers in the Episcopal liturgy of the Holy Eucharist says this: "Deliver us from the presumption of coming to this table for solace only and not for strength; for pardon only and not for renewal." We all gather, lay and ordained, week after week at the Lord's table for solace and strength, for pardon and renewal. We gather at the Lord's table to offer ourselves as disciples; to heed Jesus' command "follow me."

There is a new ordained disciple at our table: Rod Perez-Vega. Welcome, Rod, to this holy and awe-ful calling of disciple.

## June Preludes and Postludes

During the school year, I try to play Preludes and Postludes that fit with the suggested hymns for the worship services. Each summer I have taken a little liberty with the music by selecting a theme and working my music around that theme. In past summers I honored birthdays or anniversaries of the death of composers such as J. S. Bach and Johann Pachelbel. One summer the music was based on tunes from the Shaker tradition. Last year I played pieces based on hymns that were favorites of members of St. James'.

As I was planning for this summer, I thought about playing my favorite organ pieces. Since worship will be in the Great Hall this summer and I will be using the piano, I will not be able to use this theme. Still anxious to share some of my favorite pieces, I will be playing these during June and will also use some during the fall. The music for June includes four by Johann Sebastian Bach – two of his preludes, an Air and "Be Thou But Near".

Another selection is Psalm XIX by Benedetto Marcello, a real favorite of mine. The psalm begins with the words "The heavens declare the glory of God". The music ends with four beautiful chords which I always think of as "Alleluia!" I am not sure if my reaction is based on the fact that I feel the music also declares the glory of God or if it is that I am thankful that I have successfully reached the end. Anyway, I hope that you will find this piece as inspiring as I do. The final piece was written in 1915 by James H. Rogers but is meant to sound as if it were from an earlier musical time.

*1<sup>st</sup> Lieutenant Thomas Malejko*



The 21st Theater Sustainment Command's Best Warrior Competition was a grueling four day competition that challenged every participant physically, mentally, and emotionally. Over the course of the event 15 Soldiers participated in a variety of exercises to test their proficiency in a number of Army tasks. These tasks included: weapons qualification (five different weapon systems), land navigation, combative, uniform inspections, a physical fitness test, a obstacle course run, and a stress fire.

Participants were also required to lead a variety of patrols designed to assess the competitors knowledge of leadership, operational planning, and

ability to successfully complete an assigned mission. The final event of the competition was a physically demanding 12-Mile Road March which stretched the competitors physical and emotional limits. When the smoke settled 1st Lieutenant Thomas Malejko was named the Best Officer. For his efforts he earned the Army Commendation Medal and the right to represent the command at United States Army Europe competition at the end of July. ***Congratulations Thomas!***

## LOVE FREE OR DIE screening at St. James'



On Friday, June 29th at 7 p.m., there will be a screening of *Love Free or Die*, the award-winning biography of Bishop **Gene Robinson**, at St. James' Episcopal Church in Hackettstown, an Oasis parish since 1991. The screening will be free. A freewill offering will be taken to support further promotion of the film. A discussion will follow the screening and refreshments will be available.

Winner of a special jury prize at the 2012 **Sundance Film Festival**, *Love Free or Die* is "compelling storytelling, even for those familiar with the outlines of Robinson's story: his 2003 consecration as a bishop, the backlash from conservatives within the U.S. and global church, and the Episcopal Church's decision at its 2009 general convention to continue to ordain gay bishops and to develop blessing ceremonies for same-sex couples," as reviewed by Peter Montgomery in *Religion Dispatch*.

Others in the church - both for and against Bishop Robinson's ordination - are interviewed, including the Right Rev. **Otis Charles**, who came out and married his partner after retiring as bishop of Utah; the Right Rev. **Barbara Harris**, the first female bishop in the Anglican Communion; and a Ugandan woman living with HIV.

Footage from some of the major public events in Bishop Robinson's episcopacy are featured, including a dramatic confrontation with a heckler while preaching in England.
