When my son was about eight years old, he began to use the telephone. Remember, this was the olden days of corded phones, with the main household phone being a wall-mounted unit in the kitchen. One of the first calls he received was from a neighborhood boy asking him to come to a birthday party. As Alex was talking details of who would be there and what the favors were to be, I observed him. He held the phone to his ear with one hand, twirled the phone cord with the other, as he walked back and forth across the kitchen. I was stunned into jaw-dropping stillness. There he was: a picture of *me* on the phone!

Who has not observed similar resemblances among family members? The way a person smiles, a walk, a particular gesture, the tilt of the head. It is not as much about looks as about action, behavior. We all know the old tongue-in-cheek saying, “do as I say, not as I do.” And we all know that’s not how it works. Whether you believe the apple doesn’t fall far from the tree, or actions speak louder than words, you know for sure that the great majority of the ways we learn to behave come from imitation.

The apostle Paul knows this. He tells us time and again that the key to experiencing real, authentic Christian life is by imitating Jesus.

Lots of the things we imitate are innocent, such as a Jersey accent or the way one holds a fork, or even seeing your child as your own “mini-me.” But others are deeper and have lasting effects. Our work ethic, our attitude toward spouse and kids, and even our church attendance are things we pick up from others. Even things like prejudice, intolerance or discontent can be the byproduct of conformity to the bad behavior of those around us.

We are what we imitate. Each of us is a combination of influences resembling many people in our past and present. We conform to the image of others, even as others are conforming to us.

This understanding brings great power to the words of Paul in the letter to the Philippians. He gives a loving but firm command, one we’ve heard him offer time and again in his letters to the church. “Brothers [and sisters], join in imitating me, and keep your eyes on those who walk according to the example you have in us” (Phil. 3:17, ESV). Paul knows that imitation is the way to go and that we are creatures of conformity. What Paul is telling the Christians of Philippi, and what he is telling us is this: “You’re going to copy. You’re going to mimic someone’s steps and mirror someone’s movements when it comes to learning the Christian life. That’s how it is for human beings. So if you’re going to imitate somebody, go ahead and imitate me. Follow me as I follow Jesus.” True words, even if Paul had no problem with a weak ego.

Paul would have loved what went on here at St. James’ last weekend. We hosted the 30 Hour



Famine, when young people fast for 30 hours and gather for an overnight together to learn about hunger, to feel it, and to do service projects for the larger community. Nine young people from St. James’ and The Church of the Assumption played a team game where we learned about

life in places where even to go in search of food and water is dangerous. We spent a good part of Saturday at the Sussex County Food Pantry, packing bags, stocking shelves and sweeping floors. We did some chores around the church, including polishing the bells for the bell choir, which feeds our souls. Others helped to prepare the common meal to break our fast.

Let me tell you who these young people had to imitate:

- † Two priests, who led the exercises and organized the time and logistics. They helped us learn more about hunger and what Jesus wants us to do about it.

- † A family man with plenty on his own plate who slept on the floor and participated in the games and education.
- † A mom, likewise with plenty to do, who shopped for the ingredients and cooked soup to break our fast. Oh, and she made three trays of brownies too.
- † People who donated money to the young people for hungry children.
- † Parents of the young people who transported and supported them in this experience, some fasting along with their children.
- † A youth minister who lives her ministry with young people every day, who led them more deeply into their conversations and worked alongside them at the food pantry.
- † The director of the food pantry, who already spends much more time than required at her job, opening the pantry so that we could learn and have an opportunity to serve.
- † A volunteer at the food pantry, who gently taught the young people what life is like when you cannot feed your children, and how to help.

The Scriptures tell us that as we imitate the likes of Paul, as we learn from the faith and life of our baptized brothers and sisters around us, the end result is a community of people who resemble Jesus. Jesus, who in his living and breathing, in his walking and talking, in his healing and loving, became our example. Paul also tells us that as baptized disciples of Jesus, we have begun a lifelong journey of being conformed to the image of Jesus. That is, we will slowly but surely start acting like him, loving like him and resembling him.

May it continue to be so.

## Junior Warden

As someone who runs early in the morning before work, I've been waiting patiently all winter long for the sun to rise early again. For many months now, the summer's carefree days when I could do miles before work in bright sunlight have been gone for sometime. The cold and darkness of winter mornings have been completely different and challenging. Being connected to this undeniable rhythm has been quite an experience.

Since I refused to run in the dark, sometimes there has been simply no time to go running before work. I would stare out from my garage into the darkness ready to go and hoping for the first glimmers of light. But sometime the light came too late for me to do the run I wanted to do that day. It truly put me in my place and I was humbled.

But despite this, I knew there was hope and change was coming in the form of spring and earlier sunrises. I knew this on a scientific level of course but I also anticipated and cherished it as something more meaningful to me. It was something I experienced deeply when I first began running early last spring. It was emotional and life changing to wake-up and hit the road so early.

I not only knew change was coming, I “felt” it. When people would complain about the cold, the snow or the weather in general all winter, I would never, ever complain. Why? Because, no matter how cold or stormy the days, I knew that each day, behind the clouds, the sun was rising just a little bit earlier. It was slow, but indeed earlier and I was patient. I always maintained my never ceasing hope that the reality of darkness would end and I would bound from my garage at 6:30 am to take on the world once again ....(something, by the way, I did early on Feb 26th!)

My year of running has revealed to me many things spiritual that I never anticipated. I learned of the beauty and wonders of creation right in our backyards. I’ve learned to appreciate and practice a greater degree of patience, hope and trust on both a physical and psychological level. And of course a better understanding of the gift of life itself and all our loved ones who surround and support us.

As Easter approaches and I see the all of us at St. James’ prepare for this special season, I find parallels to my year-long running journey. The trials of darkness into the light of the Resurrection; the patience of Lent; the quiet comfort knowing that there is hope and strength in our faith when others may unfortunately may not have a sense of the gift of faith. 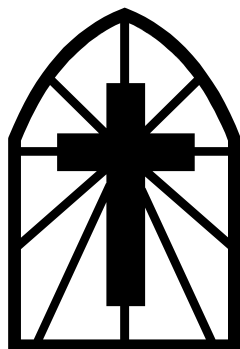
## Vestry Hi-Lites

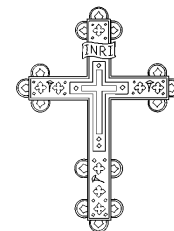



David will be relocating to Seattle, Washington.

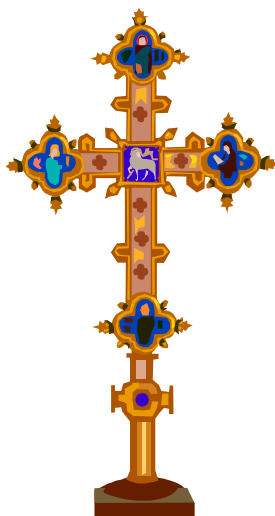
The collection of knitted and crocheted items donated continues to grow even though we have not had many get-togethers so far this year.
