It was our first Sunday back in the sanctuary following another summer of worship in the air-conditioned coolness of the Great Hall. And, as usual, it was still summer and quite warm and muggy. But the joy of being back in the sanctuary and taking the Sunday of Labor Day weekend to find our way around again, to see what is missing (the wireless mike), or what we forgot (glasses of water for servers). But for me, the joy of being in the sanctuary, which is steeped in prayer and full of the holy residue of sacraments, overrides the snafus of the absence of matches for the candles or confusion of who sits where in the chancel.



And so when one of our older members took ill during the service, I imagined our first day in the sanctuary would be remembered as chaotic rather than joyously peaceful. Yet what unfolded before our eyes was an exquisite dance, choreographed – some might say – by Jesus himself.

Immediately following the announcements, I noticed some activity at the rear of the church. Two members surrounded the man who appeared to be unresponsive, speaking quietly to him. One of them soon fetched a cloth, wet it with cool water and held

it to his neck. As the Deacon set the table, I made my way to his seat, where I was assured that 911 had been called to assist him. Returning to the altar, I saw the interpreter sign to me that she was an EMT and would go to his side until the ambulance arrived. Her husband, seated in the congregation with their preschool daughter, was also an EMT. When he joined his wife to assist the man, another woman sat with their daughter. The Music Director, skilled in sign language, stepped into the interpreter's position. The priest announced that medical attention was on the way for the man, and that when they arrived, we would be in silent prayer until their job was done. The man was as comfortable as we could make him, two professional EMTs were at his side, and so the Holy Eucharist proceeded.

The ushers directed people seated at the rear to go forward first to receive communion in order to keep that area clear. The priest and Eucharistic Minister made their way to the man with the bread and wine. Then the congregation moved easily, without anxiety. As I watched, I saw the dance – the people of God moving into the places they needed to be, paying attention to what needed to be done. No one was in the way of another, there was no panic, no rushing, just an awe-filled time of the way I imagine the kingdom of God to be.

Sydney Carter wrote: "I see Christ as the incarnation of the piper who is calling us. He dances that shape and pattern which is at the heart of our reality." He knew that Jesus the Christ is the caller of the tune and it is our job as disciples to listen carefully for it and move to its rhythm.

The ambulance arrived and trundled the man off to the hospital. He was alert when he left. When I saw him in the ER later in the day, he was his usual gracious and friendly self, with a new story to tell. I love his stories about where he worked before retirement, where he traveled, the books he read. But one thing sticks in my mind: he said, "I knew you were praying for me. I felt the prayers."

I caught my breath. I laid hands on him and prayed again.

The dance of that day will stay with me for a long time to come.

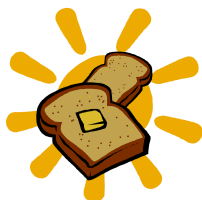
Between October and December we will be taking a journey Into the Wilderness - a six session study into the book of Exodus:

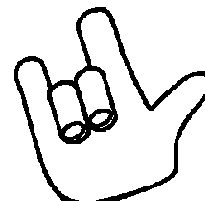

Senior Choir

Rehearsals for our Senior Choir started on August 25 to

get a head start on the anthems for the first two weeks back to 10am services. We have a theme going for the first few weeks in our anthems as the lyrics look at our relationship with our worship and how we respond to Jesus’ call to us to live in the Gospel. Our anthem for the return of 10am worship is “Come and Find the Quiet Center”. The next two weeks’ are “The Summons” and “What Does the Lord Require of You”. All three of these pieces come from the same music book as this summer’s opening hymn. The book is a supplement to the United Methodist Hymnal and features pieces from various composers and sources including the Iona Community in Scotland (The Summons), and our Lutheran brethren (Come and Find the Quiet Center).

As always we are always looking for more members. Our rehearsals are Sunday mornings at 8:30am and we meet in the Mitcham House living room. Attendance at every Sunday is not required. The ability to read music is also not required – if everyone read music we’d hardly need to rehearse!

Here at St James’ there are many rooms open to our congregation – the sanctuary, Narthex, Great Hall, Mitcham House, and the Lady Chapel. While seemingly empty and used less often, the Lady Chapel is none the less the site of weekly chapel Eucharist, Holy Thursday vigil, Good Friday service and at times has provided a worship space for the sacraments of reconciliation and marriage.

In addition to all these activities, the Lady Chapel is the home of the St James’ columbarium. Located in two marble-like resin blocks with memorial marker plates on either side of the altar, the Columbarium is a vault with niches or reserved spaces for urns containing cremation ashes and is designed to hold and memorialize these remains.

Many church members favor the idea of being inurned at the place where they worship. It is simple to frequently pay respects to deceased loved ones and can increase participation in the church from generation to generation. By reserving a niche in a church columbarium, you are supporting ministries and programs of St James’. At this time the columbarium is the permanent resting places of several members and nonmembers of St James’.

It is never easy to have “the talk” with your family about plans for the disposition of your remains after death. Our life on earth is limited; our responsibility is to attend to all necessary final arrangements.

The Vestry of St James’ is asking all church members to be mindful of this aspect of good stewardship and consider the benefits that the columbarium offers.




