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## 2 Sundays in Lent

### What We Heard You Say and Saw You Write

Most of all, a big thank you to all who participated in our "2 Sundays in Lent" and especially to the many of you there are who contributed to making it happen. So many of you contributed in so many ways to helping us come to know each other better and I, for one, am immensely grateful.

A very special thanks to Phyllis and Paul Bartkus who collated all that you wrote and prepared wonderfully clear summaries and a chart of what you said. By the time that you read this Journal, these lists and summaries and chart will have been posted on the "White Wall" near your Post-it notes and the children's posters. I invite you to take some time to read them and hear them speak to us about what is important to us.

I'd like to share with you some of what I heard you say and saw you write.

A few of you have been among us for some 50 years and have fond memories of the strong church school, ice skating and youth programs with Fr. Sickles; a reminder of how important it is that we make such provision for our young church members today. A few of you came in dribbles during succeeding years with a large group of you coming during the ministry of Fr. Riley; a time remembered for its warmth, fine preaching, acceptance of all and discussions about the Bible. About half of us came during the twelve years that Cathy was rector. The Bartkus' have listed what you say brought you here.

When asked to identify what has led you into a deeper understanding of the Christian Faith and a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ, your responses

seemed to gather in four areas. The first is the recognition, experience and celebration in St. James of the fact that Jesus and his Church are about an inclusive welcome and support of everyone, no matter what, and a deep caring and praying when one among us is hurting. A second is the way in which St. James' makes possible opportunities to reach out and help local people through the Backpack Program, North Porch, ministry during Sandy and the 30 Hour Famine and to become friends working with people in our Appalachian Ministry. A third is through the experience of taking special parts in our worship like acolyting, LEMming and participating in the choirs and especially the Bell Choir. A fourth is through the educational and faith sharing experience of EFM, and preparation for baptism and confirmation.

One doesn't have to be around St. James' for very long before becoming aware that it is considered by many to be a really fun community of which to be a part. When asked what has been the most fun for them here, people focused on the Bell Choir, the Boar's Head Dinner, the Agape Feast, the Super Bowl Parties, the Murder Mystery Dinners, fund raisers, and especially the Tricky Tray, and choir meals between Christmas and Easter services.

While adults were busy posting and discussing our children were creating posters. One assignment was to illustrate how being at church makes you feel. The results: pictures of sunshine, butterflies and cats and "It makes me happy". Asked to illustrate whom and what God loves we got pictures of all kinds of people and things with "Chicken Nuggets" on a list. A highlight of our time together was a fashion show by the children of the tee shirts they made with illustrations of what St. James' made them think of.

A final exercise for the adults was to envision St. James' as a person and after responding to all kinds of questions (see the Bartkus' chart) adults were asked how they would introduce St. James' to a friend. The overwhelming number of responses spoke of St. James' as a warm/welcoming/close/dear/caring/accepting/ loving/kind friend and, on at least one, "Someone who will be your best friend".

No wonder that I find it such a privilege and joy to be among you!

The Bell Choir participated in the 10 AM worship service on May 4. We rang a rousing arrangement of *Earth and All Stars*, a hymn not often sung at St. James'. It is hymn 412. As you wait for a service to begin, you might want to read through the words which are quite contemporary, mentioning things like classrooms and labs, athlete and band.

On June 22, Musician Recognition Sunday, the Bell Choir will be ringing *Festive Celebration* by Kevin McChesney at the 10 AM service. We have rung many pieces by this composer. This particular piece is not based on a hymn tune, but does have a very pleasant melody. It offers the ringers opportunities to use several different techniques with the bells. Listen as the bells are dampened into the table pads (called *Martellato*), shaken, plucked or struck with mallets while placed on the tables along with standard ringing. Hopefully the choir will enjoy preparing this piece and the congregation will enjoy hearing it.

This will be the final ringing for the Bell Choir for the 2013-2014 program year. We all hope that our ringing has enhanced your worship experiences and that by the choir's participation in many events outside of St. James', the community was able to hear about St. James', its opportunities for worship and its many programs.

One of my thoughts is that choir should not be all work and no play. So on May 4 members of the Bell Choir met after rehearsal for a potluck lunch. Everyone enjoyed sharing the delicious food and especially having a chance to sit and talk and share fellowship. Several of those in attendance asked to do it again and we are working on having another potluck in June or during the summer, depending on schedules.



## Take a look at North Porch

A newly elected Jr. Warden once commented that it was amazing to see just how many things were going on behind the scenes here at St. James'. Just one of these is our outreach through the North Porch Women and Infants Center. We are host to a satellite location for this Diocese of Newark organization that provides supplemental and emergency food and supplies to mothers and their infants and toddlers. Eligibility is based on economic need and those participating can get baby formula and supplies once every three months. Recently we spoke with Miss Laura, who is the North Porch, Dover Center Coordinator, who comes to St. James' every Friday. In round numbers about 40 families or about 80 children are served here each month. The focus is on the needs of children up to 3-years-old. Formula is provided for children from newborns to one-year-old and baby cereal is provided for 6-month-old and older. Miss Laura indicated that they have needs for formula powder (Enfamil), pull-ups, regular size tubes of Desitin ointment, size 4-6 diapers, wipes and baby shampoo. ## Terror in Nigeria

On April 14, 2014, members of an Islamic fundamentalist group known as Boko Haram, invaded the Government College in Chibok\* Borno State in Nigeria and abducted about 300 teenage girls who were at the boarding school to take their final exams in Physics. They got the cooperation of the girls by telling them that they were soldiers come to take them to safety. About 50 girls were able to escape but the rest of the girls were taken into a forest where there are camps used by their abductors. Boko Haram in the local Hausa language means Western education is forbidden/taboo, and this group is particular about girls getting married rather than getting a western style education. This particular group has been terrorizing North Eastern Nigeria for the past five years. This year alone they have killed close to 2000 people, razed several villages, bombed churches, schools and markets, and caused all kinds of mayhem. Their main tactic has been to bomb and kill in major public or religious institutions such as churches, schools, police stations and markets. While they say they want Nigeria, a secular state, to resort to Islamic Sharia Law, many legitimate Islamic authorities have condemned the group and its tactics.

Earlier on April 14 there was a bomb blast in a bus station that killed more than 50 people in a suburb of the Nigerian capital Abuja, in the center of Nigeria. Boko Haram claimed responsibility. Abuja has generally been spared the worst of Boko Haram attacks with most of the mayhem being restricted to the north east of the country, but with this bombing the level of destructive activity has risen to an alarming level. The Nigerian government seems helpless to control the situation.

Groups within Nigeria have used social media to generate support for getting the girls back by launching a twitter campaign #BringBackOurGirls, to bring awareness to the plight of the abducted girls. As a result of this campaign, three weeks after the abduction, the international media started to cover the abductions extensively. The US, UK, France, Israel and China have sent help in the form of technical advice and drones. However no girls have been returned and Boko Haram

has continued to bomb and kill villages in the Chibok area.


On May 20<sup>th</sup> a market in Jos, another town in the middle of Nigeria was bombed. Boko Haram is suspected of being responsible for this act. Jos has been a hot bed of violent clashes between various groups struggling for power and resource control in an area that marks the divide between the mostly Muslim north of the country and the mainly Christian south. However there has been a period of peace; it was hoped that the worst had passed.

I grew up in Jos and my parents still live there. I also went to college in Borno state and what is happening now seems so alien to the experience I had growing up in northern Nigeria. While there have always been tensions in Nigeria, people (particularly Muslims and Christians in Northern Nigeria) have always found ways to live together. What has now become the norm is killings and retaliation. The happenings in Nigeria are very distressing and I ask that we as a congregation pray for the safe return of the abducted girls of Chibok and for the people of Jos and other towns in northeastern Nigeria that are afflicted by the scourge of Boko Haram. There are many things that are wrong with Nigeria, but killing innocent citizens and kidnapping young girls is no way to solve the problem. Your prayers are desperately needed.
