This Month in Stewardship

Matthew 24:44 states, "Therefore you also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour." Be prepared.

As we exit the season of Pentecost, we enter the season of Advent, a season of preparation. Bridging between these two seasons in our liturgical year are in-gathering and planning activities of stewardship. Recently, we celebrated our annual stewardship/fellowship dinner, had our in-gathering of pledges and food bags, and presented our pledge cards at the altar. Stewardship season is not confined to one season, as it extends throughout the year. In our present season, the altar colors are purple, the Advent Wreath candles are lit in church, the Tree of Giving is up, and we are preparing for Christmas. This is meant to be a quiet time of reflection, repentance and good works.

This year we recognized an act of good works and officially dedicated Snyder Hall in memory of Mr. Snyder and his generosity and stewardship. Throughout his life, Mr. Snyder practiced stewardship by participating in community organizations, serving on our Vestry, caring for his resources and then, through planning, bequeathed a portion to St. James'. His example of planning is a model for us to follow. We ask that you consider following Mr. Snyder's example and remember St. James' in your will or final arrangements.

There are other ways to provide for St. James'. If you wish to learn more about making a qualified charitable distribution from an IRA, or a direct donation of shares of stock, please see either our Treasurer or a Warden. While it is best to consult a tax professional to consider your specific circumstance, we may be able to help.

If you have not yet made your declaration of commitment to St. James' through a pledge of time, talent and treasure, it is not too late. Pledge packets are available in the rear of church. Place your completed card in its envelope and place in the collection plate or mail it to the office. All pledges will be accepted by prayer at the altar. Your planning now helps our vestry prepare for our next year.

Snyder Hall Dedicated

The St. James' Parish Hall was dedicated as "Snyder Hall" in memory of William O. Snyder at a ceremony held after the 10 am service on Sunday, November 20, 2016.

The Rev. Guy Fouts led a procession of the congregation into the hall singing the hymn, "Christ Has Made a Sure Foundation".

Once in the hall, past Senior Warden, David Lacouture and current Senior Warden Paul Bartkus read from Corinthians and Matthew.

The congregation then sang the hymn, "The Church's One Foundation".

Mr. William Hibler, who knew the late Mr. Snyder through his parents, provided a brief bio of Mr. Snyder's life in Hackettstown and surrounding areas and reflected on his many years of community service, generosity and stewardship to St. James'.

David Lacouture explained that Mr. Snyder's significant bequest to St. James' 20 years ago made it possible in 2016 for the Vestry to rebalance the church's financial health by significantly paying down the mortgage principal and establishing affordable monthly payments. A portion of Mr. Snyder's gift remains invested to provide additional annual income for the church.

A special bronze plaque was unveiled that bore the image of Mr. Snyder.



After a blessing from Rev. Fouts, the congregation together proclaimed that now and hereafter the building will be called "Snyder Hall."

The ceremony ended with "America the Beautiful" in honor of Mr. Snyder's military service in the United States Navy during WWII.

A brunch reception hosted by Jeannette and Cynthia Nolan followed.



St. James' Youth Choir Singing During Advent and Christmas

The Advent and Christmas season will be a busy one for our Youth Choir. Once again, they will participate in the ecumenical Story of the Nativity at the Port Morris United Methodist church on Sunday, Dec. 4, at 5pm. This program features a narration telling the story of Mary's selection to be the mother of Jesus and the time leading up to and including the birth and the visit of the Wise men. Puppetry, singing, bells, drama, and instrumental selections are woven throughout to bring the narration to life.

The Tree of Giving



Advent begins the new year of our church calendar and marks the season of anticipation and preparation. We begin a new church year and get ready to retell the story of the miracle of the birth of Jesus, of a poor family struggling to find a place to rest, of the wonderful gift given

to us, and later, the gifts brought by the Magi to honor the baby Jesus. And so, we prepare to celebrate our greatest gift by sharing presents with our families.

At St. James, we have a tradition of preparation and giving. Our congregation portions out a bit of their time and treasure to share in giving to some who would find it difficult to provide gifts for their children at Christmas. For more than twenty years we have sponsored children from two or three local families who are struggling due to economic circumstance by buying gifts suggested on the Tree of Giving.

Families are selected through the school nurses at local schools. The families' identities are anonymous, and the nurses work with the parents to develop a wish list of toys and clothing, which we transform from wishes to gifts.

This year we will support the children of three families and place candy canes with their gift suggestions on the Tree of Giving. We hope you will visit the tree, located in the upper lobby of the Moore St. entrance, and take a tag to help a child. Complete directions are provided at the tree. The children of the Sunday School will replace each tag with an angel. **Gifts are due at St. James' on or before the Fourth Sunday of Advent, December 18th.**

Although we do not get to see the children's reaction as they open their presents, we do get feedback from the nurses who tell us how grateful the parents are and that we have made a difference for those families by helping them have a Christmas that they didn't expect to have. Each year this ministry reminds us to give thanks for our many blessings, by giving a blessing to someone else.
