# St. James Parish Stewardship Sunday Sermon

John A. McKinney, Jr. October 28, 2018

To set the table, so to speak, for my comments this morning, please pull out the lectionary reading and look again at today's collect. Almighty and everlasting God, increase in us the gifts of faith, hope, and charity; and, that we may obtain what you promise, make us love what you command; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

I'm sure you heard the word charity in the collect. That's why, fortuitously, it's appropriate for today's stewardship sermon. So, let's address charity from a theological angle. Let's start with The Episcopal Catechism found in our Book of Common Prayer [at p. 860] - Q. What is required of us when we come to the Eucharist? That's a good question because we want to be prepared for the Eucharist. A. It is required that we should examine our lives, repent of our sins, and be in love and charity with all people. There's that word charity again. But our catechism is only an Outline for the Faith. In its briefness, it doesn't define charity. The much, much longer Roman Catholic Catechism defines charity as a theological virtue by which we love God above all things for God's own sake, and our neighbor as ourselves for the love of God. [No. 1822] It says charity is benevolence, friendship and communion. [No. 1829] I understand what friendship and

communion are. But in preparing this sermon, I wanted to look up benevolence to be sure of its definition. It is a kind act or gift or the doing of kind things for others. An example of benevolence is a gift of money.

Did you catch that, "a gift of money"? I'll say it again, a gift of money. Now, are you all braced for the annual Stewardship Sermon, a sermon that rightly, but perhaps more forcibly than you like, ties charitable scriptural references to giving? And not just giving but giving until it hurts!

Well, this year, I'm here to say that we should not give until it hurts. If you hurt, you can't be happy. Instead, we should give to be cheerful, knowing that our gift pleases God. And to do that, let's look at what should be the first step to consider in making our annual pledge.

I'd like to share with you a thought from Murray J.
Harris, a Professor Emeritus of New Testament Exegesis and
Theology at Trinity Evangelical Divinity School in
Deerfield, Illinois. "All too often we regard stewardship
simply as a matter of our giving to God, but this aspect is
secondary. Before we can give, we must possess, and before
we possess we must receive. Therefore, stewardship is, in the
first place, receiving God's good and bounteous gifts."

What are those good and bounteous gifts in your life? Starting with God's gift of Jesus to humankind and his exaltation, how long would it take for you to list every one of those gifts? Could you ever? I don't think I could. Perhaps that's why, as with a bounteous harvest of corn, it's hard to focus on just one ear or just one gift. But each is a gift from God and we owe it to God and ourselves to focus on, understand and determine if we can share that gift with

others. And many of God's gifts, including God's grace, can and should be shared with others.

Murray Harris also wrote that, gifts received from God "are not to be used solely for our own good. They must also be used for the benefit of others, and ultimately for the glory of God the giver. The steward needs an open hand to receive from God and then an active hand to give to God and to others."

By the pledge and payments you make from the gifts God has given you and which you accepted, your gifts will be "used for the benefit of others, and ultimately for the glory of God." Each gift will benefit others in the St. James community, a community greater than just the worshippers here during a year. St. James is prized in the Hackettstown area for its charitable outreach efforts benefiting others. Our gifts will continue and even expand these efforts, efforts that glorify God.

Not only will each gift benefit the parish, they will honor and validate the gifts from past generations. I rarely enter this church without being grateful to prior parishioners who started this parish and built this wonderful building. We should never forget their faith in the future and their gifts to reclaim this church after losing it. Now is not the time to break faith with them and let this parish and its church home suffer from financial uncertainty. Our generous giving, coupled with our gifts of time and talent, enable us to be stewards of this property so that it may be passed on to future generations of Episcopalians.

God sees the heart of the giver, not the size of the gift. When you give to God, God gives to you. So

don't give until it hurts. Knowing everything you have is a gift from God, and that by giving you show the charity God shows you, give the amount that makes you happy. After all, to quote the old truism,

God loves a cheerful giver.

The St. James' Green Team continues to meet, conduct research and make plans for ways in which the congregation and people at home can

better participate in good environmental stewardship.

The Team has shared recycling tips in the Journal and bulletin and will continue to do so. The Sunday School has also become involved.

Outdated hazardous chemicals and oil based paint from the Mitcham house basement were brought to the Warren County Hazardous material drop off day held in September. Old latex paint will be disposed of next. The Team plans to do further research in order to provide education and dispel myths about recycling. The team is finding that Warren and Morris County have slightly different procedures which will influence what people do back at their homes depending on their residency.

Meanwhile, inquires will be made to other churches about "green" related programs and activities.

Activities are also being planned for next spring. The Green Team is always accepting new members and ideas. Meetings are generally at 9 am in Snyder Hall. The date of the next meeting will be announced.

#### Death in Our Diocesan Family

#### The Rev. Dr. Charles L. Rice

December 12, 1936 – October 8, 2018

(Editor's note: Rev. Rice has led several worship services at St. James' over the years including the Sunday after 9/11 and was loved by our congregation.)



With sadness we share the news of the death of the Rev. Dr. Charles Lynval Rice, 81, peacefully at home on October 8, 2018, surrounded by just some of the many people who loved him. A memorial service will be held on **Saturday, November 17, 11 AM** at St. Peter's Church in Morristown.

He received degrees from Baylor University, Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Union Theological Seminary, and Duke University. His published works include: *Interpretation and Imagination, Preaching the Story* and *The Embodied Word*. In 2017 his novel *Sea Camp* was reworked and published, after 35 years in a bottom drawer.

At the age of 19, Charles was ordained a Baptist minister in his grandparents' church in Chandler. He served as pastor of Iredell Baptist Church in the hill country of Texas from 1956 to 1959, while at the same time serving as a student pastor in Kentucky and New Jersey. While a graduate student at Duke, he became a minister of the United Church of Christ and served parishes in Chapel Hill and Durham, North Carolina.

After receiving a Ph.D. in religion at Duke, Charles served as chaplain and taught at Salem College in Winston-Salem, North Carolina (1967-8), as a missionary teacher at the Federal Theological Seminary of Southern Africa (1968-69), and as Acting Dean of Students and visiting professor of American Christianity at Duke Divinity School (1969-70). In 1970 he joined the faculty of the Theological School of Drew University in Madison, New Jersey, where he taught for 32 years. He retired as Professor of Homiletics in 2002.

During his early years at Drew, Charles served as interim minister of Stanley Congregational Church in Chatham, New Jersey, and Union Congregational Church in Upper Montclair. He came to feel that his calling was with the Episcopal Church, into which he was confirmed in 1987, ordained deacon at the **Church of the Messiah in Chester**, and ordained to the priesthood in **Grace Church, Madison**, in 1988. Bishop John Shelby Spong confirmed and ordained him. He served at **St. Peter's Church in Morristown** as priest associate from 1988-96 and as interim rector from 1996-97.

In addition to his ministry at St. Peter's, Charles served as interim priest or priest-in-charge at St. Luke's, Hope; Christ Church, Short Hills; St. Dunstan's, Succasunna; St. Thomas', Vernon; and St. Mark's, Mendham. He also served at Trinity Church, Mt. Pocono, in the Diocese of Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, and The Church of All Saints -by-the-Sea in Maine. He served two terms on the Commission of Ministry of the Diocese of Newark. For 20 years he was a member of the Board of Kirkridge Retreat and Study Center, near his home in Bangor, and he continued to teach there after retirement. He also led groups of adults and young people to Taizé, the retreat center in France to which he had made a life-changing pilgrimage in 1984.

Over the years, Charles enjoyed his relationships with Union Theological Seminary, Princeton Theological Seminary, and the Chicago Association of Theological Schools, where he taught on various occasions and served as president of the Academy of Homiletics.

In 1975 Charles met Robert Barker, with whom he subsequently lived in Madison, New Jersey, Bangor, Pennsylvania, and most recently Tuscon, Arizona. Together they renovated two old houses and a barn, tended gardens, and enjoyed entertaining their many friends. In their 42nd year together, Charles and Bob were married in St. Peter's Church on Epiphany Day, January 6, 2014. Soon after, they moved to their new home in Tuscon, Arizona.

Charles is survived by his husband, Robert Barker, his brother Wayne, of Owen, Wisconsin, three nieces, five nephews, many grandnieces and nephews, and a host of friends.
